From the Pastor's Desk

Why are we afraid of things that go bump in the night on October 31? It always confuses me when someone says that allowing our children to trick or treat is not Christian. They really don't know the full history of Halloween: It has a Christian origin.

The name "Halloween" comes from the All Saints Day celebration of the early Christian church, a day set aside for the solemn remembrance of the martyrs. Originally, this was held on May 13. but Pope Gregory III moved it to November 1, the dedication day of All Saints Chapel in St. Peter's in Rome and right in the middle of the Celtic festival of Samhain. Later, in the 840s, Pope Gregory IV commanded that All Saints be observed everywhere. Then in 998, St. Odilo, the abbot of a monastery of Cluny in southern France, added celebration of All Souls Day on November 2. This was a day of prayer for the souls of all the faithful departed, not just the recognized saints of the Catholic Church. All Hallows Eve, the evening before All Saints Day, began the time of remembrance. "All Hallows Eve" was eventually contracted to "Hallow-e'en," which became "Halloween."

It was common practice, as Christianity moved throughout Europe, for church celebrations to coincide with a pagan holiday in order to counter pagan influences and provide a Christian alternative. Usually that only managed to "Christianize" a pagan ritual - the ritual was still pagan, but mixed with Christian symbolism. That's what happened to All Saints Eve - it was the original Halloween alternative!

In late October, as people were getting things prepared so they could survive the winter and as the days grew shorter, they held a three-

day festival celebrating the final harvest and the beginning of winter, the season where the earth lies fallow and dead. And those three days were October 31 to November 2. During this particular festival, the Celts believed that the curtain that divided the living and the dead lifted and allowed the spirits of the dead to walk among them. They believed the spirits were earthbound until they received a proper sendoff with treats - possessions, wealth, food, and drink. Spirits who were not suitably "treated" would "trick" those who had neglected them.

Throughout the centuries, Samhain and All Hallows Eve mixed together. The mixing did not stop with the Celtic festival and the Christian celebrations of the saints and souls, but more would be added to this mixture. During outbreaks of the bubonic plague - the Black Death - in 14th/15th century France, the "dance of death" made its appearance. This was commonly painted on the walls of cemeteries and shows the devil leading a daisy chain of people - popes, kings, ladies, knights, monks, peasants, lepers - into the tomb. Then we add in Guy Fawkes Day, November 5, the day the plot to blow up the Protestant King James I and his Parliaments was foiled. Guy Fawkes Day is a celebration in England when bands of revelers put on masks and visit local Catholics in the dead of night, demanding beer and cakes for their celebration: trick or treat!

Now send all these traditions over to the United States, mix it up with a good dose of immigrant tradition, and you get American Halloween. Oh, and witches at Halloween? They were added by the greeting card industry. Greeting cards did not

"Trunk or Treating" starts at 6 p.m., but please come around 5 p.m. to decorate and set up your vehicle. And bring **lots** of candy: last year's event was a howling success!

Other October activities include Daytime Circle Brown Bag on October 1 at 1:30 p.m.;

UMM Breakfast at Tom and Ray's on Columbus Day, October 13, at 8 a.m.; and Ladies Lunch Out on October 15 at noon. Host families are needed for Coffee and Conversation on Sunday, October 19, and Sunday, November 30.

Continuing a look ahead to November, we'll host our Special Needs friends for a Groovy Movie Sing-Along and dinner on Saturday, November 1, and of course, mark your calendar now for our Annual Holly Days Bazaar on Saturday, November 22.

From Pastor John's Pulpit

Focus on Jesus

Lead me, O Lord in Your righteousness because of my enemies, make Your way straight before my face. (Psalm 5:8)

Have you ever tried to walk a perfectly straight line along a muddy path? It's not as easy as you might think. When walking on a muddy path, most people tend to walk slowly with their heads focusing intensely at their feet. When someone attempts this task with their eyes cast downward, their footsteps become unsteady and crooked. When you walk with your eyes constantly looking down at your feet, you have no idea where you're going. There's no perspective because you cannot see how you fit into the larger landscape.

There's no genuine focus since every step treads over the last step's focal point. You haven't imagined yourself as part of a bigger picture.

The only way to make a purposeful line of progress is to forget about your feet. The key is to look straight ahead and set your focus on a fixed target ahead of you. It can be a fence post, a street sign, or a tree off in the distance. Then, with your eyes fixed on that target, just start walking. When you lock your focus on a target ahead, the immediate problems become stepping stones towards your goal.

The same is true in our lives. If we walk through life concentrating only on what lies ahead of us, we will fail to see the bigger picture and allow little distractions to become major obstacles. But when we look beyond ourselves and fix our thoughts and spiritual eyes on Jesus Christ, we can trust that our paths will be straight and trustworthy, every step of the way. Jesus is our big picture. The ultimate goal of our lives. He is our final prize of all our endeavors. It is my prayer that the Lord will help us to keep our eyes on Jesus at all times no matter what.

Mission's donations were made to Damascus Help food pantry and the UMCOR Ebola crisis campaign. The Childhood Brain Tumor Foundation received \$125 from the dinner tip jars and a small donation from Missions.

Old Business: Electrical work for the sanctuary is almost finished with the exception of lighting. The lights have been backordered.

New Business: Doug has received a proposal for upgrading the sound system and forwarded the information to the Memorial Committee. Mike is asking the committee chairs to

work with their committees and bring information to the October meeting with their 2015 plans. Randy Falk made a motion to purchase 100 calendars with the church's name imprinted on them. Vote taken and motion was approved.

Kudos from the Chairman of the Board: Kudos to volunteers who worked to make this year's VBS the best ever (Weird Animals and All!) and best attended, thanks from all of the congregation. We all recognize that for many children, their exposure to Christ in VBS is for some the only religious experience they will have; for others, it is the beginning of a lifetime relationship with Jesus.
