From John's Pulpit

LOOKING TO JESUS

"Therefore we also, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily ensnares us, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith." (Hebrews 12:1-2)

In the Greek games, a judge would stand at the finish line holding in plain sight the laurel leaves that would be awarded to the victor. As runners came down the final stretch, they were exhausted, tired, and feeling as though they couldn't go another step. But suddenly there was the prize in sight, and a new burst of energy would kick in. This is the picture behind the phrase "looking unto Jesus" in Hebrews 12:2.

We have to keep our eyes on Jesus Christ. And our prize is the privilege of standing before God and receiving the crown of righteousness that He will give us. That is why we live the Christian life, why we try to live godly lives, and why we try to reach people for Him.

It isn't for the earthly riches. It isn't for the applause. It isn't for the notoriety. It is for us to hear Jesus say to us on the final day "well done, good and faithful servant." It isn't to earn God's approval, because as believers we already have it. But it is to ultimately say "Lord, the life you gave me and with which I tried to make a difference, here it is. I offer it to you."

"Looking unto Jesus," that is what keeps you going, even when the going gets tough. You can get discouraged at times. People will let you down. They will disappoint you. They won't appreciate your hard work. They won't see your efforts. They won't see your real motives. They will criticize you. That is when you remind yourself, "I am

Remember also to save items for our area schools and nursing homes. Just collect them in a baggie or envelope, and then give it to me when it is full. All of our local schools appreciate your help!

Here is a list of most of those things...

General Mills Box Tops for Education: These box tops can be found on all General Mills products (including cereal, granola bars, rice mixes, pasta mixes, etc.), Bisquick, Betty Crocker cake mixes and frosting, Old El Paso products, Kleenex brand tissues, Zip-lock and Hefty plastic bags and paper plates, Avery of-

fice supplies, Yoplait yogurt, and many other products, so check out your packaging carefully before throwing it away. Each one is worth 10 cents, so the money can add up quickly!

Campbell's Labels for Education: These labels are found on all Campbell's beans, gravies, and soups (both cans and individual servings) as well as on V-8 products, Vlasic pickles, Swanson frozen products, Prego spaghetti sauce, and all Pepperidge Farm products. Be sure to cut the dashed coupon off each product label.

Tyson's A+ for Education: These labels can be found on all Tyson chicken products – both fresh and frozen. Each one is worth 24 cents for an area school.

Printer Ink Cartridges: Don't throw these away! Schools can recycle them for cash.

Small Plastic Lids: Save the ones that you take off soda and water bottles as well as gallon milk jugs and orange juice containers. Art teachers use these to mix small amounts of paint and to make collages.

Recent Magazines: When you are done reading these, do not recycle them. Instead, give them to an area nursing home. They like to have these available for their residents to read and enjoy.

You can save all of these items and send them to area schools yourself, or you can just bring them to church and give them to me. I will be sure that they get to one of our area schools or local nursing homes.

In addition, remember to bring your **aluminum foil, cans, and pie plates** as well as

Thanks so much to everyone who donated school supplies for the Faith Connections Back to School drive. Missions also contributed \$200 in backpacks and supplies. Some very needy and deserving children will start the school year off with the necessities for a successful one.

Missions also donated \$300 for the food pantry to Damascus Help. The pantry's shelves are always low during the summer because giving is down due to vacations, etc.

We are also donating \$500 to UMCOR for the Ebola Crisis. Since the beginning of the Ebola outbreak this spring, the United Methodist Church has been active in the relief effort. In Liberia and Sierra Leone, UMCOR healthcare networks have deployed personnel to distribute life-saving supplies and protective equipment, treat victims, and advise the inhabitants of the stricken areas on preventive practices that can keep Ebola from spreading. Despite the hardships, UMCOR has pledged to ramp up its relief efforts and support the United Methodist health care facilities, so they can keep their doors open.
